# **School Success and Priorities**

#### 2017/2018 Successes

1. Cultural Proficiency – Onanole students and staff continue to work to infuse indigenous perspectives into our curriculum. In 2017/2018 we spent time learning about residential schools leading up to recognition of Orange shirt day. We infused indigenous perspectives through: a focus on the 7 teachings in our community groups, grade 7/8 students attendance at the UNESCO student conference and meetings at CMHR.

#### 2. Mental health and Wellbeing-

Improved understanding and

supported through the use of Zones of
Regulation, PAX and Mindfulness
Programs within the school.

- 3. Literacy- Based June 2018 report card data Grade 1-8 82% of our students, grade 1-8 are achieving level 3 or 4 in the writing domain. We had set a goal of 90% for the school last year and we will maintain that goal for the upcoming year.
- 4. Numeracy -: 86% of our students achieved a 3 or higher in the area of mental math according to June 2018 report card data. We had set a goal of 90% for the school last year and we will maintain that goal for the upcoming year.

#### 2018/2019 Priorities

#### 1. Cultural Proficiency -

Further Increase students' knowledge and understanding of First Nations Metis and Inuit (FNMI) perspectives.



#### 2. Mental health and Wellbeing-

By the end of June 2018, Students and staff will show an increased understanding of the concept of emotional intelligence. They will display increased understanding of self- regulation strategies that they can use to positively affect their mental well-being.

#### 3. Literacy-

By the end of June 2018, 90% of students from 1-8 will achieve a minimum grade of 3 (good understanding and application of Concepts and skills on the provincial report card scale) in literacy. Specific focus will be given to writing.

#### 4. Numeracy –

By the end of June 2019, 90% of our students will meet grade level performance in the area problem solving.
