School Success and Priorities

2018/2019 Successes

1. Cultural Proficiency – Onanole students and staff continue to worked to infuse indigenous perspectives into our curriculum. In 2018/2019 our staff took part in a guided snowshoe that incorporated indigenous teachings about the land. We infused indigenous perspectives through: a focus on the 7 teachings in our spirit groups, grade 7/8 students' attendance at the UNESCO student conference and meetings at CMHR.

2. Mental health and Wellbeing-

Students and staff have
Improved understanding and

supported through the use of Zones of
Regulation, PAX and Mindfulness
Programs within the school.

- 3. Literacy- Based on June 2019 report card data Grade 1-8 91% of our students, grade 1-8 are achieving level 3 or 4 in the writing domain. We had set a goal of 90% for the school last year and we will maintain that goal for the upcoming year.
- **4.** Numeracy -89 % of our students achieved a 3 or higher in the area of problem solving according to June 2019 report card data.

2019/2020 Priorities

1. Cultural Proficiency –

Further Increase students' knowledge and understanding of First Nations Metis and Inuit (FNMI) perspectives.



2. Mental health and Wellbeing-

By the end of June 2020, Students and staff will show an increased understanding of the concept of emotional intelligence. They will display increased understanding of self- regulation strategies that they can use to positively affect both their own and their students' mental well-being.

3. Literacy-

By the end of June 2020, 90% of students from 1-8 will achieve a minimum grade of 3 (good understanding and application of Concepts and skills on the provincial report card scale) in literacy. Specific focus will be given to reading through our sprints collaboratively with Erickson Elementary staff.

4. Numeracy –

By the end of June 2020, 90% of our students will meet grade level performance in the area of problem solving .
